Rockin Recalls!!

Having a great recall is probably the single most important behaviour you can have. In some ways it's like the yard stick of your relationship, if your dog spins on a dime and races to you whenever you call their name – you know things are well and healthy. If however, you call your pooch and they simply look at you and then continue what they were doing or worse, they head the other way, then read on. There are a few reasons why recalls are rotten and some simple ways to make them Rockin!

Rotten Recall Reasons n Reasonings

- 🐾 Your dog doesn't know their name! We funny humans assume that just because we call them a name it has some meaning – it doesn't until we give it meaning.
- 🐾 Your dog doesn't know what you are "talking" about meaning you never taught, so he never learnt, what a recall is.
- 🐾 Your dog finds the environment much more interesting than you ☺ Find your happy voice and smile, skip, play – whatever it takes!
- 🐾 Your dog has been in trouble for returning to you (being scolded for destruction or not coming when you first called).
- 🐾 Your dog thinks "come" is a game of chase because you stomp to get him & he can run, then you chase, & he can run some more
- 🐾 Finally, he believes that "come" is big trouble! He only ever gets called when in he's in trouble.

Now some simple Do's and Don'ts

DO

- 🐾 Choose your word for recall and only ever use this word when you KNOW Spot will come - we want 100%!
- 🐾 Use a high pitch happy voice (or a special whistle might be easier for the guys).
- 🐾 Always REWARD, REWARD, REWARD for coming to you. Use the highest value rewards you have. Lavish praise, play games, scratch, pat, treat, laugh – just make it good & Happy.
- 🐾 Call Spot when he is already on the way to you – then you get to REWARD.
- 🐾 Be more interesting and FUN than other things around Spot, so if it takes you rolling on the ground to get his attention or doing a little "look what I've got" dance – then do!
- 🐾 Use feeding time to practice and reinforce recalls. Prepare his meal and wait till you get the chance to use your recall before giving it to him.
- 🐾 Train your recalls in a boring quiet place to begin with and slowly add things they find distracting

eg: start in the bathroom, then the deck, the back yard, front yard, street, etc.

- 🐾 Do lots of these short distance recalls. These teach your dog better and you get to do more of them in the same amount of time.
- 🐾 Set your dog and yourself up to succeed by setting up recall practices every day – the more the better. 1 recall a day is better than none!

DON'TS

- 🐾 Don't call Spot if you have **any** doubt he will come. You go to him instead.
- 🐾 Don't ask for a sit when he gets to you or that will be what you are rewarding. Get your recall right for now and you can add the sit later.
- 🐾 Don't use your recall before doing things they don't like such as baths, pills, ear cleans, etc.
- 🐾 Never punish, yell, scold or similar when your dog has just come to you. It will make coming to you 'good only some of the time' and you want it to be '**good all of the time**'. Even if he is doing something you don't want him to, don't call and scold – go to him and lead him away.
- 🐾 Don't play chase games where you chase him.

Games for recall

- 🐾 A great recall game is Hide and Seek - have someone hold your dog while you hide in a very easy place (like just around the corner with your leg showing). When you call their name, the person lets him go. You then play, praise and reward him for finding you. As he learns the game you can make it increasingly difficult. Once they get the hang of this, it will become a favourite game and each session reinforces your recall. (A great game for a rainy day!)
- 🐾 When your dog is several feet away, call him and then begin running backwards away from him. Reward and praise when he catches up. This uses his natural desire to chase so should be a rewarding game in itself.
- 🐾 "Come" and "Get It!" Throw a treat down the floor and encourage your dog to "get it!" As he picks up the treat and looks back at you, call "Come!" and toss a treat the other direction, again encouraging him to "get it!". This works best in long hallways or even ground where the dog can see the treat easily as it rolls.
- 🐾 Play collar grab games where you touch or hold his collar and it always means a reward. This teaches them not to back away from having their collar touched. 🐾

REMINDERS & NOTICES

Every dog, training with us, must be fully **VACCINATED**. Bring your vaccination papers to training and have it recorded. Help us to help you, protect your dog from nasty diseases.

Keep your dog restrained, on a lead and collar unless otherwise instructed. Thanks.

Your Dog's Daily Health Check (In under 2 minutes)

Knowing your dog is a key to early detection of many health problems and can help you know when to seek veterinary help. What is normal for your dog? When you know that, you will quickly see if there is something wrong or a problem that might need treatment.

You'll need to train your dog to accept the following handling. Remember to reward them as they are learning to be handled, be patient, gentle and never force them. Most dogs will love the attention of a daily health check.

Nose - should be cold and wet but all dogs vary. Get to know by touching the back of your hand gently to their nose.

Mouth - You will need to get your dog accustomed to having their mouth opened on cue. Start with one finger just under their upper lip, reward. Next time move that finger slightly, reward. Build on this so your dog is comfortable having their teeth and mouth looked at. Aim to have them comfortable when one hand is on their upper jaw and the other on their lower.

Teeth should be white, clean and gums firm and pink. In some illnesses gums become pale. What is the normal colour of your dog's gums? How many teeth do they have? If there are gaps, where are they? Do they have any broken teeth? If you find teeth are yellow with plaque and tartar build up, bad breath, inflamed, receding or red gums then you may need to seek veterinary advice.

Eyes - should be clear, bright and free of discharge. How do their eyelashes sit? If you notice any redness, irritation and scratching, discharge, growths or any changes to your dog's eyes, seek veterinary advice.

Ears - The inside should be pink and clean. Get them used to having their ears looked at and handled, as you will need to clean them from time to time. What do their ears look and feel like on the inside and out? How often do they get dirty? What do they smell like? A bad or unusual smell may indicate infection. (nb: let ear cleaners/drops come to room temp before using – cold ear drops are mean)

Legs and feet - Run your hands firmly over your dog's legs from the shoulder to paw then hip to paw. What does it feel like? Where are the protrusions


and hollows? What do their feet look like on top and below? How do their pads feel? Are they soft and clean? Is their hair that needs trimming between toes in coated breeds? Is it smooth between the toes or are their lumps and injuries? How long are their nails? Do they have their dewclaws? Do they need trimming? It is best to get a qualified professional to show you how to trim your dog's nails before trying this yourself.

Body – run your hands over their body and know the feel. You should be able to feel ribs not a layer of fat. Can you see your dog's waist? Does your dog need to lose some weight?

Tail - again what feels normal, are there lumps or bumps? Where do they carry their tail?

Coat - a skin or coat disease may show as any of the following: a flat dull coat, a rough coat (breed dependant), excessive shedding, dandruff, abnormal odour, hot spots, patches of hair loss, red inflamed areas, excessive scratching and rubbing, excessive chewing or licking of feet, the genital area and face rubbing.

A dog's coat should be shiny and healthy. Groom them regularly to remove dead hair. Coated breeds will need special grooming – ask a professional groomer to show you how to care for the coat between visits.

When bathing your dog only use good dog shampoos as human shampoo has much lower pH levels and are too harsh for the dogs more sensitive skin. Try not to wash your dog more than once a month as they do need those natural oils to keep their coat lovely.

Storm Season

If you have a dog with an existing phobia or a puppy that is yet to experience the wet, then now is the time to act.

Sounds Scary is a CD full of noises which you can play to get your puppy acclimatised to these noises. These are available through many internet companies.

Another particularly helpful item is a DAP infuser. DAP (Dog Appeasing Pheromone) can be purchased through your veterinarian or perhaps on line. The infuser releases a pheromone identical to that of a lactating bitch. The smell calms dogs and can aide in removing stress.

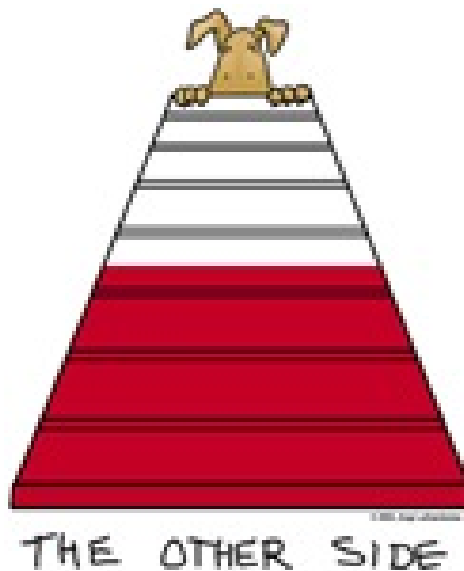

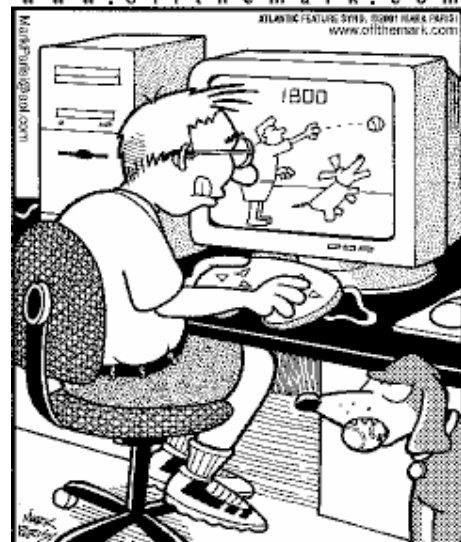
